The Necessity and Power of a Preaching Team

A couple of months ago I published an article entitled “*A Word About Preaching*” in which I laid the groundwork for establishing a preaching team in the church. In this first missive I said that, “I believe in the necessity and power of a preaching team and that it can lead to a healthier and more sustainable proclamation ministry.” Let me unpack this a little further.

First, let’s begin with scripture (always a good place to begin). In the book of Acts it is clear that the church at Antioch had a preaching team, “*Now there were in the church at Antioch prophets and teachers, Barnabas, Simeon who was called Niger, Lucius of Cyrene, Manaen a member of the court of Herod the Tetrarch, and Saul*” (Acts 13:1). This verse clearly shows that there was more than one preacher/teacher, in fact there were five! The background of this verse shows a very diverse combination of individuals; Simeon was a black man, Manaen was an upper class Jew and a member of King Herod’s court. Lucius was a God-fearing Gentile, Barnabas was a Jew and a member of the Levite tribe and finally Saul was a former Pharisee. This made for a powerful coalition in the early church.

One of the reasons developing a preaching team is beneficial to the church is that it allows pastors to leverage other gifts. Often churches buy into the notion that preaching is the essence of pastoral ministry. This is borne out by the common practice of having a candidate come preach a “trial sermon” before the church votes on his/her candidacy. While preaching is a crucial skill, there is much more to being an effective pastor than just preaching. As any seasoned shepherd knows, the various tasks of ministry require significant amounts of time, energy, and attention. Preaching teams free up lead pastors to devote resources to other areas of ministry on the weeks they’re out of the pulpit.

Secondly, while a lead or senior pastor has a responsibility to “shepherd” his/her flock which undoubtedly involves competent preaching, he or she also has a responsibility to “equip the saints” (Ephesians 4:11-12). It is also incumbent upon the senior pastor to develop others in the flock in the art of preaching. These individuals must exhibit spiritual maturity, commitment to the church and possess basic communication skills. When it appears that someone has the potential to communicate effectively from the pulpit, the senior pastor and church leaders must intentionally open up more opportunities for them to preach. This is both biblical and practical. When I am gone, either as a result of a plan or unexpectedly, I would rather have a legacy that leaves other gifted communicators of the God’s truth to serve the church, than one that simply saw me preach a lot because people liked it.

In my next paper we’ll look at how to help a church transition from the traditional “one preacher” to a team of preachers.

The weeks of waiting for the candles full light help us recall the world’s long years of waiting for Jesus, the Light. Each Sunday in each service, one of our church families will light the Advent candle and read scripture, share a short message and lead us in prayer.

Hanging of the Greens

This year we begin decorating both of our sanctuaries on December 2nd the first Sunday in Advent, from 3-6pm. It is a day that we prepare and reflect on the meaning of the many symbols of Christmas and turn our facility into a festive and sacred house of worship benefitting the season.

Christmas music lies at the heart of the holiday season. You hear it all around you... grocery stores, shopping malls, and on the radio. Our favorite holiday carols accomplish something miraculous in this day and age – they send a blatantly sacred message to an increasingly distant and disillusioned world.
